COACHES REPORTS

Premier Grade

Well it is that time of the season to wrap it up for the Premier Grade. While we are obviously disappointed to bow out of the finals after only the one showing, particularly in what will be a tight contest, we can at least point to achieving a top four finish and contributing to the Club Championship.

The final season table position for the team is as below:

The teams above us finished with Cottesloe – 68, Wests – 67, Nedlands – 64. This table position illustrates that it was the most evenly matched competition for many years, with the final table position not determined until the last round.

Overall it is fair to say that consistency in some of the tight games against the other top sides in the second round cost us a top two finish. However it is pleasing to point out that we earned our place in the finals on the back of our bonus points that came from good wins where we managed the 4 try bonus point and those games we did lose were usually by the less than 7 point margin which pointed to our competitiveness in these matches.

We have had our fair share of injuries this year but pleasingly it has provided some good opportunities for players on the fringe of selection to step up and show that they have the goods to play at Premier level. This was a significant factor this year that hasn't been as strong in the past and is clearly illustrated by the success of Reserve Grade as they vie for the Premiership in the Grand Final. The weekly selection meetings where there has been some serious debate over many selections has been a pleasing illustration of the variety of players we can rely on as the club goes forward.

The other aspect to come out of the year has been the growth of the forwards as a unit, under the guidance of Mike Brain and Adam New. At the start of the year we had some troubles with our set piece that by the end of the season it was a clear strong point for us. The mobility of the pack and the players capacity to get around the paddock meant that we were striving to play a mobile game but at times we were able to punch up through the middle with some good tight drives and pick and go forward. These were ably lead by Dirk Gleghorn, Damien Elton, Guy Hodgson, Geoff Xanthis and later in the piece Jason Parrish and Al Norcross. Our backrow challenge was not so much who was available but how we could fit the quality and calibre of John and Ross Trend, Chris Rovira, Doug Pashley, Luke Nelson, Graham Watson and Bear Brain all into the team. A great dilemma to have and one that bodes well for the future.

Pleasingly this year we saw the flair of the backs more regularly and there was a continuing contribution on the try scoreboard. Again the work by the players and capacity to adapt in a number of positions was a feature. To the likes of Robbie Barrugh and Matty Shaw who had a ding dong battle for selection throughout the season for the No. 9 position. With Toby Relf and Ryan Parkin later in the season also providing the guidance and direction at 5/8th. The Centre pairings varied but generally revolved around the cornerstone of Ross James, who was inspiring in his defence throughout the season. Until injured late in the season it was pleasing to see Justin Samulski providing some real penetration out wide. The back three groupings of Dave Dunstan,

Matt Dreyer, Charlie Norcross, Tim Newton and Troy Hindmarsh then tried to capitalise on the breaks and certainly showed some flair for counter attack.

Overall as a team group we developed a wider variety of attack and multiphase patterns, that with a little more consistent application would have seen us in a stronger position at the end of the season. Again though as our more youthful players continue to gain experience this knowledge base should provide solid building blocks that will hold up well into the future. It is this aspect of the development of the younger players who have literally just come out of Colts last year that is the fantastic news for the Club. At times we had 4 to 5 players who were all 20 yrs of age playing Premier Grade rugby. Congratulations are in order for the Club process that encourages and more importantly equips the players to step up to this level.

As it is the last stage of the season it is important to thank those that have assisted the senior grade through out the season. I would like to note the efforts of my fellow coaches. Mike Brain who stepped into his first formal year of coaching with great energy and some very good ideas on that dark art of forward play. Our appreciation and of course best wishes go with for his planned sojourn in Spain. Ben Piggott as our strength and skills conditioning coach has done a great job on this aspect. I think it is fair to say that we were one of the fittest side, but importantly from the players perspective what Ben did was provide plenty of variety throughout a long season that certainly helped to keep the energy and enthusiasm levels up.

To our Managers – Owen Ferguson and Dave Newton, your capacity to keep the team in order and kitted out was much appreciated. The efforts of the entire physio team very ably lead by Steffi are always appreciated. Finally I would like to thank the players for their very positive attitude throughout the season. It is a pleasure to coach when players turn up with an interest and intent to train hard and develop their skills.

I know going into next year is one of anticipation with the retention of what will hopefully be a good core of senior experienced players, but more importantly some really exciting talent in our younger players plus of course the next crop of talent coming out of the Colts ranks. With success in our Reserves and these building blocks it is an exciting time for Soaks Rugby. I would like to encourage the younger players to believe in their capacity to match it with those more experienced and in the words of Michelangelo to set their goals to a flag in 2006.

Reserve Grade

Finals Time !!! and 2nds are in with a great chance of taking the flag. Our guys put in huge effort in the major semi-final to beat Cottesloe and go straight through to the Grand Final. If successful, it will be Soaks' first Premiership for 2nd Grade since 1998.

At the end of the home & away season Soaks finished in 2nd place on the ladder with 12 wins and 4 losses, and 5 points behind Minor Premier Cottesloe.

We went into the Major Semi-Final against Cott last weekend feeling confident – even if the last couple of training sessions showed plenty of nerves amongst the players. But once our boys got on the field Cott didn't get a look in, as we played our best game so far this season. It was great to see the team play to the pattern they practised so much at training.

Two tries and a penalty in each half and a perfect goal kicking game from Bucket had us leading 34-0 in the second half. We let in a couple of soft tries late in the game for a final score of 34-14. It was a great effort by the guys and we are straight through to the Grand Final, where we meet the winner of Cott vs Wests.

The forwards provided steady ball from the set pieces, even under strong Cottesloe pressure. But it was the contest at the breakdown where Soaks forwards dominated. When we had possession, the hit-ups, cleanouts, and desire to go forward were simply outstanding. The support play by the back row was excellent, and the tight five provided a no-nonsense barrier which Cott could not break through. Some of the highlights include Blocker's taking of the lineout ball, the cleanouts by Jason, and great tackling by Wes.

The tackling and vigorous cleanouts at the breakdown by the backs were equally as good. Blake loves the hard stuff and several times laid on a big hit and then stole the ball. The quick ball delivered to halfback Matt Shaw from the cleanout was first rate, and once the ball was in their hands, the backs spun it fast and wide. The first two tries were scored directly from this pattern, with one to Bucket and the other to Ben Lindegaard. From a coach's perspective, it's great to see a plan work so well.

This pattern of play continued for most of the second half, and with injection of the fresh legs of Chris, Dirk, Brainy & Tom, the forwards continued the momentum. Binnsy played the game plan perfectly, kicking to the Cott corners. From one of Cott lineouts on their 5m line, Tom made the charge down and then scored the try. Beautiful to watch. The fourth try came from a typical Matt Shaw dart from the back of the breakdown. Somehow he found his way through a herd of Cott players and ran 40m to score. Bucket had a great day with the boot, landing all four conversions and two penalties, and made plenty of metres with his clearing kicks.

All the players in the run-on team and the reserves played out of their skins in the semi-final, and deservedly receive the accolades. But we don't forget that there are other players who also train and reserve for the team, but were not selected to play. These players also deserve our recognition and thanks. Thank you to all players who have been part of 2nd Grade and made this year so successful.

Thanks to Nik, Piggo, Owen and Marty for all the help during the year. Also thanks to Steph, Bec, Leah, & Graham for looking after the boys and keeping them strapped.

B Grade - Green

The season is almost at an end, and now is an opportune time to reflect on the team's remarkable last rungs of the ladder it has climbed en route to the finals.

Some new and not so new faces have re-emerged in the past couple of months. In his first game back for two or three years – indeed, in his first *minute* back against Rockingham, Jono Beesley gathered a wayward ball, feinted left then right, checked to see his wife Marish was watching, nudged the ball ahead and dribbled it just shy of the line, before picking it up and diving (an unnecessary embellishment) to score. We would also like to thank the physios (Bruce calls them 'strappers' – it is fortunate he doesn't suffer from the Asian affliction for mixing the 'r' and 'l' letters), Stephanie, Bec and Leah. At all times they performed their duties with a tender hand, a ready smile, and an aesthetically pleasing manner.

The team looks forward to doing the Club proud in the upcoming Grand Final.

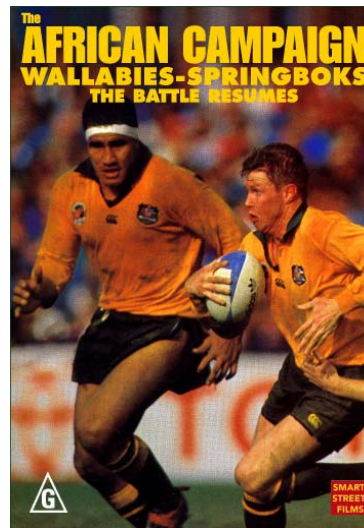

In **THE RUNNING GAME** we join the Wallabies on one of the last long tours of the United Kingdom and Ireland. For three months The Seventh Wallabies of 1981/2, who had made sacrifices to participate which can hardly be understood today, were sustained by comradeship and hospitality as they travelled through Britain's worst winter this century.

THE AFRICAN CAMPAIGN: In August 1992, Australia's World Champion Rugby team, the Wallabies, arrived in South Africa to decide who was the best team in the world. Three lead up games and a single test match meant this short tour would be one of unprecedented intensity and drama. The sides had not met for twenty three years. **Nick Farr-Jones, Marty Roebuck, Paul Carrozza, the young John Eales, Willie O, Lynagh, Campese, McKenzie, Kearns and Co.** were on a hit and run mission to decide the heavyweight champions of the world.
